Seville

Located in the south of Spain, the impressive city of Seville has an incredible wealth of history. It is the capital of the Autonomous Community of Andalusia and today has а of over population seven hundred thousand inhabitants.

It was created by different Iberian tribes before being known by the Romans as *Hispalis*, being renamed later as *Ishbiliya* with the arrival of the Arabs.

In the 13th century, with the Reconquest, it passed to the kingdom of Castilla y Leon and later became one of the pillars of the Spanish Empire with the conquest of America. While some of the city's monuments and historical sites have a Moorish character, others maintain a Gothic style characteristic of the Middle Ages, and many others are modern creations that are in stark contrast to what came before.

We must mention the **Cathedral of Seville** with the **Giralda**, the **Alcázar** and the **Archivo de Indias**, places declared World Heritage Sites by UNESCO.

In addition, **Seville** has an innumerable list of beautiful and unique buildings, both civil and religious, which contain numerous works of art by leading architects, sculptors and painters. Seville is considered the cradle and capital of flamenco, which has been declared Intangible Heritage of Humanity. Seville is also the city that has inspired the most operas over the centuries: 150 compositions, some of them as universal as "Carmen", "Don Giovanni" or "The Barber of Seville".

Chaine der Robinseurs 2 – 5 MARCH 2023 | GRAND CHAPITRE OF SPAIN When you walk through Seville, it is inevitable to look from one side to the other because there are surprising palaces, buildings or beautiful small squares around the place.

Most of Seville's important monuments are in the historic centre. It could be said that we are facing one of the most monumental cities in Spain and not only because of the number of monuments, but also because of their quality.



Cathedral of Seville


Also known as the Cathedral of St. Mary of the See, it is the largest Gothic cathedral in the world and the third Christian temple after St. Peter's in Rome and St. Paul's in London. Since the conquest of the city, on November 23, 1248, the building of the aljama, or the Almohad Mosque, was converted into the cathedral of the archdiocese of the Kingdom of Seville.

The Giralda is the bell tower of the Cathedral. It its day, it was the tallest tower in the world, standing at 97.5 m in height, in addition to being one of the most famous images of the city and Andalusia. The tower consists of two different but perfectly unified pieces, a perfect example of the crucible of cultures existing in the city.

The Muslim body is the oldest part, started in 1184 by order of Abu Yaqub Yusuf to be the minaret of the Almohad mosque of Seville. A curious fact, the Giralda does not have stairs, but instead has 35 ramps wide enough to allow the Sultan to ascend mounted on horseback to see the beautiful view.

In the 17th century, the current Christian part, the bell tower that tops the tower, was added by the architect Hernán Ruiz. The top of the tower is the "Lily section" which has four jars of bronze lilies, one on each corner. And above this, there is still another section in a more Renaissance style. On December 29, 1928, it was declared a National Heritage site, added to the list of Heritage of Humanity sites.






Alcázar

The Alcázar of Seville has always been used as lodging for kings and important personalities. It is made up of different buildings from different eras. The original fortification was built on an old Roman settlement, later used by the Visogoths. Later is became a Paleochristian basilica (San Vicente Mártir), where San Isidro (Saint Isodore) was buried. The Real Alcázar of Seville began to take on its present appearance after the Arabs took over the city in the year 713. One of the palaces that surrounds two courtyards is of the same era as the Alhambra of Granada.

After the reconquest of the city, in 1248, the "Reales Alcázares" were of the successive monarchs. Alfonso X the Wise made the first reforms, creating three large Gothic salons. Pedro I later decided to build the wonderful Mudéjar Palace. Declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO, the Real Alcázar has also been the scene of several productions, such as The Kingdom of Heaven, Alatriste or Game of Thrones.

Torre del Oro



It is a watchtower located on the left bank of the Guadalquivir river, in the city of Seville, next to the bullring of the Real Maestranza. It is 36 metres tall. It closed the passage to the Arenal with a section of wall that united it with the Torre de la Plata, which formed part of the walls of Seville that defended the Alcazar. It is a tower formed by three sections. The first dodecagonal section was constructed between 1220 and 1221 by order of the almohade governor of Seville, Abù I-Ulà.


It seems that it owes its Spanish name "Torre del Oro" (Golden Tower) to the golden reflections produced by the tiles that covered it at the time. The second section, also dodecagonal, was constructed by Pedro I, the Cruel, in the 14th century. The upper cylindrical section completed the tower, being built in 1760 by the military engineer Sebastián Van der Borcht. It was declared an historical-artistic monument in 1931.



Archivo de Indías

The Archivo General de Indias of Seville was created in 1785 at the request of King Carlos III, in order to centralize in one place all documentation referring to the administration of the Spanish colonies which, until then, had been dispersed in various archives: Simancas, Cádiz, and Seville. La Casa Lonja de Mercaderes in Seville, built during the reign of Felipe II between 1584 and 1598, was chosen for the archives, where it remains to this day. The archive is home to about 43,000 files, with some 80 million pages and 8,000 maps and drawings that mainly derive from the metropolitan agencies in charge of administering the colonies. It was declared an UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987, together with the Cathedral and the Reales Alcázares.

Inside is the central courtyard, built of stone with wide proportions, with arches fastened to the pillars with half columns. Notable is the current main staircase, built by Lucas Cintora.



Barrío de Santa Cruz

In the Barrio Santa Cruz is the city's old Jewish quarter. To wander through its streets full of legends is a great pleasure. In addition to beautiful hidden corners, you'll find lovely squares such as the Plaza de Doña Elvira, the Plaza de la Alianza and the Plaza de Santa Cruz, where Seville's famous painter Bartolomé Esteban Murillo is buried



Hospítal de los venerables

Los Venerables Hospital and Diego Velázquez Centre was founded in 1675 by Canon Don Justino de Neve, today this is the headquarters of the Fundación Focus. It has a beautiful central courtyard and its church contains paintings by Valdés Leal and Lucas Valdés. This beautiful building is also home to the Diego Velázquez Centre, where his works and those of his contemporaries are displayed.









Setas de Sevilla

Located in the Plaza de la Encarnación, in the heart of the city, it is a wooden structure with a concrete core. It measures 150 x 70 metres and is approximately 26 metres high. The designer was the German architect Jürgen Mayer. The building consists of several levels: the basement hosts the Antiquarium Museum, which displays the Roman archaeological remains found durina its construction. Higher up there is a square to host events. The upper level contains a lookout point and a panoramic route. Also inside there are many restaurants and shops. At ground level there is a market place.

Plaza de España

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The Plaza de España is a spectacle of light and majesty. Framed in the María Luisa Park, this plaza was designed by the great Seville architect Aníbal González as an emblematic space for the 1929 Ibero-American Expo. The result was a plaza-palace unique in the world. Along the entire perimeter of the plaza, there is a canal of 515 metres in length, which you can travel by boat, a truly romantic experience. Throughout this embrace, from one end of the plaza to the other, we recommend admiring the banks of tiles that represent the provinces of Spain. This has become a frequent "ritual" for Spanish visitors looing to take photographs in front of the space dedicated to their province.

The four beautiful bridges that cross the canal represent the ancient kingdoms of Spain. Two tall towers stand at the ends of the Plaza, providing the area with perfect balance. The porticoed gallery that separates the open space of the Plaza with respect to the buildings longs to be explored. Admire the impressive coffered ceiling. Several film directors have fallen in love with the Plaza de España. This monument has been seen in famous films such as "Lawrence of Arabia" or Episode II of "Star Wars: Attack of the Clones".

Plaza de toros

The bullring of the Real Maestranza de Caballería in Seville is the oldest bullring in Spain. It is the venue for the bullfights that take place during the April Fair, one of the most famous bullfighting celebrations in the world. As a square it is one of the most complicated in the world due to its layout and characteristics, as well as its public, which is said to be one of the hardest and most difficult among the bullfighting fans. You can visit its museum where paintings, sculptures (the works of Mariano Benlliure stands out), both bullfighting costumes and posters are shown and thus learn more about the world of bullfighting.



Parque Mª Luísa

With an area of 340,000 m2, in addition to its great botanical value due to the different plant species living in it, this park has an extraordinary historical interest. It was the headquarters of the Latin American Exhibition of 1929, and two beautiful squares in regionalist style were built for this: the Plaza de España, emblematic monument of the city, made of brick and beautiful ceramic panels, and the Plaza de América, where you'll find two museums: the Museo Arqueológico displays important archaeological evidence, including the Tesoro del Carambolo, treasure from the Tartessian era; and the Museo de Artes y Costumbres Populares, which houses ethnographic collections.



Museo de Bellas Artes

The Museo de Bellas Artes is the second most important art gallery in Spain. Founded as a "Museum of paintings" by Royal Decree on September 16, 1835, it opened in 1841 with works from confiscated convents and monasteries during the Confiscation of Mendizábal.

It is essential to visit the Museo de Bellas Artes to get to know Sevillian Baroque painting, especially the masters: Zurbarán, Velázquez and Valdés Leal.







TRADITIONS

To talk about Seville is to talk about traditions. colours, smells, and we could almost say flavors. It is a place of deep religious beliefs and almost all traditions have been created around them, although time has been transforming them to more modern ways. You don't have to be a believer to experience Holy Week with devotion and to walk for seven days through the streets of the city centre with that deep smell of incense and orange blossom and see the tears in the eyes of the devotees when their Virgin passes by, and the noise of drums and bugles.

The most important are the processions and their thrones, which are authentic works of art. In them, the music acquires great importance, as well as the improvised *saetas* that people sing on the way of the thrones.

The **Seville Fair** is famous for its fair day and night with their bedecked horses and gypsy dresses. The April Fair is closely linked to taurine and coinciding with this date season you can see important runs, in the Real Maestranza.

In the **Real de la Feria**, which is named after the support shown by Queen Elizabeth II, are the typical houses, about a thousand, participating in a contest that rewards its decoration. The origin of the fair is commercial and livestock and originally lasted just for three days. The Rocío Pilgrimage is famous for the great devotion that exists towards the image of the Virgen del Rocío.

From the capital Seville and from the towns of its province, numerous brotherhoods make а pilgrimage for several days to the sanctuary, located next to the Doñana marshes. It is the most massive pilgrimage in Spain, with а color and an incomparable atmosphere.

Another of Seville's big festivities is Corpus Christie, a tradition and a procession that has been held since the 17th century.


On the eve of **Corpus Christi**, some streets in the city center are filled with rosemary and are decorated with altars related to this festivity.

That same day and for eight days after, you can enjoy a beautiful Sevillian tradition, the Dance of the Six, who dance and sing before the Monstrance on the Jubilee Altar of the Cathedral..

Also highlight the **Velá de Santa Ana**, a festivity that is celebrated in the month of July in Triana, on the other side of the river, one of the most unique and ancient neighborhoods of Seville.

A series of booths are set up on Betis street where you can taste the gastronomy.

In the **Plaza del Altozano**, the nerve center of the neighborhood, music and dance shows take place, especially flamenco and sevillanas.





GASTRONOMY

Sevillian gastronomy is characterized by its great variety of ingredients and for having a cuisine influenced by its Andalusian roots.

It preserves the union of cultures, traditions and religions, but it is also open to the creativity of new chefs and flavors that have come to the city from the most surprising corners of the planet. All this makes your dishes full of colors and flavors.







In Seville, food takes centre stage. It's around a glass of Andalusian *gazpacho* or a plate of *cocido* (stew) or *rabo de toro* (oxtail) that friends, colleagues or family ritually gather, and understanding that tradition is vital to understanding the way of life of the Sevillians. In Seville, people eat out. They share food in the city's bars and restaurants. So, naturally, that's the best way to enjoy traditional Sevillian food, whether it's in the form of dishes or *tapas*, because going for *tapas* is, without doubt, the best way of discovering and falling in love with the local cuisine.

In classic Sevillian dishes the tastiest vegetables are combined with the freshest fish, shipped in every day from the nearby Andalusian coast. And we can't forget the cows and pigs that graze on the meadows of Huelva or the Sierra de Sevilla, or the sweet treats that are a legacy of the city's Muslim heritage.


