WORK	PHASE ONE: PREPARATION During this phase, the festival starts to take shape. We build everything from the ground up — starting with tents and practical setups, and finishing with the small final details. Every year we come up with new ideas and plans, and we decorate the entire area. This includes building graffiti walls, painting signs, and placing creative elements around the festival site.

There will, of course, be plenty of time at the beginning to get to know each other. We really value it if participants want to contribute with creative ideas and help us shape the festival.

PHASE TWO: THE FESTIVAL

This is the most fun phase! This is when we open the festival we've created together over the past few days.

During this time, you can relax, hang out with the other volunteers and guests, listen to music, and enjoy the festival atmosphere.

PHASE THREE: CLEANING

This phase starts Sunday morning, when guests begin heading home. We pack everything down, and it usually goes quite fast, so we finish on Sunday. Volunteers can leave either Sunday or Monday morning.

FREETIME

Since the camp is short, there are no full days off. As we get closer to the festival, there will be more to do.

From Tuesday to Thursday, working hours are approximately 10:00 in the morning until 8:00 in the evening.

On Friday and Saturday, there will be more free time, as more volunteers join. This gives you the chance to meet Danish people and experience the festival.

ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD

Get ready for the full festival experience!

Sleeping Facilities

The festival has a sleeping area where both guests and volunteers will stay in tents during the festival days. We will also sleep there in the days leading up to the festival.

We can provide tents, so you only need to bring a sleeping bag and an air mattress or something similar. Let us know if you are missing anything — we might be able to lend it to you.

Kitchen + Bathroom Facilities

A trailer bathroom will be available when you arrive.

Each day, one hot meal will be prepared by our local chef, Jens. The other meals will be simple toasts or sandwiches that we make ourselves.

LOCATION AND LEISURE	<p>The festival area is close to the sea and located in the countryside. It is an old military missile launcher site, now empty except for two garages that we use.</p> <p>The event takes place in the middle of May, so it's a good idea to bring warm fleeces and cozy clothes, as we will be outside most of the day.</p>
REMARKS	<p>English will be the only language spoken during the camp. All participants must be willing to speak English, even if they come from the same country or find English challenging. Just try your best!</p> <p>It is very important for us to have volunteers who are creative and able to take initiative. We are looking for independent people who want to contribute to the project with innovative ideas.</p>
TRAVEL INFO	<p>Meeting Point and Time: Store Heddinge St. May 11th between 12:00-16:00.</p> <p>Arrival at Copenhagen Airport To reach the meeting point on time, your flight should arrive no later than 13:00 on the first day of the camp.</p> <p>From the airport, take a train to Copenhagen Central Station. From there, take a train to Køge Station, where you can catch a local train to Store Heddinge Station. This is where we will pick you up.</p> <p>The total travel time from the airport to the meeting point is approximately 2 hours, and the cost is around €20. ORGANISATION	Aalborg City Cup was first held in 2004 and has since grown into a large international tournament with around 300 teams each year, featuring boys and girls aged 9 to 18. The tournament takes place on Aalborg Freja's 21 fields, with matches running from 8 AM to 8 PM. Every year, we welcome between 8,000 and 10,000 visitors from across Europe. In the upcoming edition, we expect teams from Norway, Sweden, Germany, the Netherlands,

Belgium, Spain, Poland, the Faroe Islands, Lithuania, and, of course, Denmark.

Each year, we have between 1,000 and 1,500 volunteers who help with various tasks, including:

- Cleaning the venue
- Serving breakfast and dinner
- Selling food at our stalls
- Staffing the information center, welcoming guests

WORK

As a volunteer at the Aalborg City Cup, you will play an essential role in making one of Northern Europe's largest youth football tournaments a success. Each year, around 300 teams and 8,000–10,000 visitors come from across Europe to participate in and watch the games. To ensure the event runs smoothly, volunteers will help in various areas, including event setup, food service, information support, and venue maintenance. Your tasks will change throughout the day, keeping things dynamic and engaging! On the first day, you'll sit down with the host to create a work plan and choose the assignments that interest you most—so be sure to read about the different tasks in advance. That way, you can hit the ground running and make the most of your experience!

Event Area Setup

Before the tournament starts, volunteers will help prepare the event area. This includes marking and setting up the 21 football fields, arranging seating areas, and making sure that everything is in place for the opening of the tournament. Volunteers may also assist with setting up banners, signs, and equipment needed for the matches and fan areas. You can also assist in one of the many food trucks on the grounds. This task is ideal for those who enjoy working outdoors and don't mind some physical work.

Work hours: 10:00 – 18:00

Food Hall Assistance

With thousands of players, coaches, and visitors attending, the food hall is a crucial part of the tournament. Volunteers will help serve breakfast and dinner to the participants, ensuring meals are distributed smoothly. This role involves organizing food trays, keeping the dining area clean, and assisting guests who have dietary restrictions or special requests. It's a great opportunity to meet people from different countries while contributing to the overall hospitality of the event.

Work hours: 06:00 – 22:30, which is divided between breakfast serving from 06:00-10:30 and dinner serving from 16:00-20:00

Information Center Support

The information center is the heart of the event's organization, where teams and guests can come for assistance. Volunteers will be responsible for checking in teams upon arrival, handing out tournament schedules, answering general questions, and helping lost guests find their way around. This role requires good communication skills and a friendly attitude, as volunteers will interact with international visitors and ensure they have a great experience at the tournament.

Work hours:

17:00 – 22:00 (on Wednesday)

09:00-22:00 (on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday).

Cleaning & Maintenance

To keep the event area welcoming for players and visitors, volunteers will help with regular cleaning and waste management throughout the tournament. This includes collecting trash, ensuring restrooms and common areas are

<p>ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD</p>	<p>Sleeping + bathroom facilities: The exact accommodation is not yet confirmed, but volunteers will either stay at a local school or a community house. If the group stays at a local school, the host will provide mattresses and sleeping bags, and there will be access to a bath and toilet. If the group stays at a community house, the host will also provide mattresses and sleeping bags. The bath and toilet will be located just across the street, and there will be a kitchen available for making snacks.</p> <p>Meals + kitchen facilities: All meals will be provided through a small token system, which can be used at food trucks. In some cases, meals will be shared with other staff, creating a great opportunity to connect over food.</p>

You mustn't arrive after 15:00, as no one will be available to receive you. If you plan to arrive the day before, we might be able to accommodate you before 15:00 on May 11th, but this is not guaranteed. Please inform us in advance if this option works better for you, and we will see what we can do.

Departure: The camp ends on June 2, 2025, with departure set for 14:00.

Arrival at Aalborg Airport:

To reach the meeting point on time, your flight must arrive no later than 11:00 on the first camp day. From the airport, take an RE train to Aalborg Vestby St., then transfer to Bus 2 and get off at Vestre Fjordvej. From there, it is a five-minute walk to the meeting point. The total travel cost is approximately 5€.

Arrival at Copenhagen Airport:

Your flight must land no later than 8:00 on the first camp day, which means you will reach the meeting point after 12:00 but before 15:00. From the airport, take a direct RE train to Aalborg Vestby St., then transfer to Bus 2, getting off at Vestre Fjordvej. The final walk to the meeting point takes

around five minutes, and the total travel cost is approximately 70€.

ORGANISATION

Center for Sustainable Development Goals (an initiative by Sønderborg Municipality) works to inspire sustainable action with the UN Global Goals at heart.

The center is based at **Lykkegaard**, a 17th-century farm complex undergoing a long-term **sustainable renovation** towards opening in 2028. Until then, we host events that bring sustainability to life—like **Byggefestivalen (the Building Festival)**: a family-friendly maker festival where people of all ages build creative projects with recycled materials, pro tools, and guidance from skilled craftspeople (this year we expect around 1,000–1,500 participants).

The festival takes place at **Kær Vestermark**—a beautiful 137-hectare nature area near Sønderborg—next to a permaculture garden and the future center site.

WORK

You will help create a fully functional Food Waste Kitchen – the heart of the festival’s sustainable food concept.

The kitchen will be made into a tent, which will be rented externally. You’ll be building all kitchen units — including hotplates, ovens, and dishwashing stations — from scratch. Everything will be designed for quick assembly and easy disassembly, so the setup can be reused again in 2027.

In addition, a dedicated recycling station will be established, where all festival waste must be delivered and sorted. The aim is to keep waste to an absolute minimum and ensure as much material as possible is reused or recycled.

PHASE ONE: PREPARATION

During this phase, the task will be to construct a complete food-waste tent. The tent itself will be rented externally, but the kitchen units with hotplates, ovens, and dishwashing areas must be built from scratch. Everything will be constructed in a way that allows for easy disassembly with the aim of reuse in 2027.

In addition, a recycling station must be established, where all

waste generated during the festival must be delivered and sorted. The goal is to minimize waste.

PHASE TWO: THE FESTIVAL

During the festival, the Camp participants will be responsible for the Food Waste Tent, including presenting the collected past-date food, ensuring that everything appears appealing and clean, and making sure that everyone uses the facility as intended and planned.

In addition to this fixed task, Camp participants are welcome to take part in the festival on equal terms with all other attendees.

PHASE THREE: DISASSEMBLY AND CLEANING

After the festival wraps up, our goal is to take care of the cleaning, tidying, and dismantling of both the Food Waste Kitchen and the Recycling Station.

As a starting point, no craftsmanship experience is required – but any building skills you do have are welcome. A professional craftsperson will be part of the project to provide guidance and hands-on support throughout the construction process.

To ensure safety, all participants will take part in a tool-handling course. In addition to the craftsperson, the camp will have a Camp Leader responsible for practical coordination and creating a good social atmosphere. We also aim to involve local young people from Sønderborg in the project.

FREETIME

The first weekend is about **team bonding**, getting to know the area, and enjoying social activities. During the weeks, you can:

- Swim in the nearby **Alssund Strait**
- Explore **Sønderborg** (cozy harbour town, cafés, history and culture)

- Connect with local young people who may join parts of the project
- We kick off our first full workday on **6 July**.

Besides the activities mentioned, we'll also make time for small excursions around the local area.

ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD

You'll stay together at a rustic **Firehut** with two built-in shelters, ~400 m from the festival site.

Sleeping: shared spaces (3–4 people). Prefer privacy? Bring your own tent and camp right outside the Firehut.

Facilities: fireplace, outdoor kitchen with **pizza oven** and stove, **cold-water tap**, **composting toilet** by the Firehut; regular **flushing toilet** ~200 m away; **hot showers** at the festival area.

Meals: Before the festival: eat with the festival build crew; some meals at the Firehut (ingredients provided by your host). During the festival, dine with festival participants.

Connectivity: Wi-Fi at the festival site (not at the Firehut).

Laundry: washing machine & dryer available at the festival campground.

Remember to bring: a **sleeping bag** (and your tent if you want your own space).

LOCATION AND LEISURE

The Center of Sustainable Development Goals, the festival, and the Firehut are situated at Kær Vestermark, which is a 1,4 km² beautiful recreational nature area 2-3 km north of Sønderborg City. Sønderborg inhabits approx 35000 people. You'll be taken on a tour and introduced to Sønderborg and local attractions.

The exciting Summer Camp has existed for 17 years and is arranged by B75, which is a value-based table tennis club with professional trainers and players.</p> <p>During the Summer Camp, 200 trainers and players from all over the world will gather for three weeks of learning, fun, friend-making, and sharing their common passion for Table Tennis. This</p>

year, they come from 43 countries. It creates a great party in the town and the atmosphere is amazing, which we would love you to become a part of.

WORK

For the Summer Camp to run smoothly, we very much rely on volunteers who are interested in helping with different practicalities. Your important effort will make a very positive change for the participants, as you will contribute to the framework of the Table Tennis Camp, which aims at empowering people, developing their skills, and bringing them together towards their common passion for table tennis.

The camp is especially good for you if you like to engage with people in a very international environment, and if you are interested in improving your teamwork and problem-solving skills, because the work requires that you adapt to changes quickly.

When it comes to the specific tasks, there will be rotation between them to make the days vary for all volunteers. These different tasks include assisting in the kitchen, with all practicalities such as cooking and serving the food to the other camp participants. Similar tasks include helping with cleaning assistance or driving shuttle buses to and from the airport, train station, and ferry terminals. Other tasks could be overseeing activities with the camp participants and the smallest children and finally helping in the administration with check-in, check-out, and room preparations.

It will also be possible to be a sparring partner in the Table Tennis Camp and interact with the camp participants. Therefore, it would be an advantage if you enjoy playing table tennis and would like to practice it some more, but no experience is needed. We welcome people at all levels! In addition, it will be possible for you to continue playing table tennis in your free time.

The program

As a volunteer, your work week will consist of 5 working days and 2 days off, though these days will be rotating between you. This

means that you might have to work on the weekend, but then you will have time off during the week. Your workday will be no more than 7 hours, and you will be working with local volunteers. Work starts in the morning and the afternoon. Some tasks, like being a part of the administration or driving team, mean you must work at different times during the day.

ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD

Sleeping + bathroom facilities:

The volunteers will be sleeping in classrooms at the local school. There will be mattresses, pillows, and bedding. The school is within walking distance of the Work Camp. It only takes a few minutes to get there. The bathrooms are next to the classrooms where you will be sleeping.

Meals + kitchen facilities:

All Work Camp participants eat in the canteen with all the other participants. Breakfast, lunch, and dinner will be provided by the Work Camp host.

LOCATION AND LEISURE

During your three-week stay in Northern Jutland, you will also have time to explore the unique nature and interesting attractions in Denmark.

Your Work Camp leaders will help you and the group with organizing these activities in your spare time. It is free to enjoy the beautiful nature of Northern Jutland, but some activities such as museums and galleries might require an extra charge. The host will not cover additional charges.

The Work Camp will be remarkably close to the beach, so there are incredibly good opportunities to go for a swim. It is also very much possible to explore the nearby towns by going sightseeing or shopping. For instance, you can arrange a day trip to Skagen, which is the Northern tip of Denmark where the two oceans meet. Skagen is especially famous for its special light, which has attracted many painters, yellow and red houses, art galleries, delicious seafood, and much more. You can also take a day trip to Aalborg, the third biggest city in Denmark, where you find a

ORGANISATION	<p>Greenlandic Children conducts social activities in Greenland and Denmark for Greenlandic children and young people in vulnerable life situations. We work to ensure that no Greenlandic child grows up in poverty, abuse, or neglect. Children must be heard and involved, and many more Greenlandic children and young people must have an education.</p> <p>We emphasize that our efforts are established in close cooperation with local authorities, organizations,</p>

professionals, children, and young people, and with respect for local needs, wishes, culture, and language.

Greenlandic Children currently has ten ongoing projects in Greenland and Denmark and is present in all Greenlandic municipalities, as well as in Copenhagen, Aarhus, Aalborg, Esbjerg, Randers and Vejle. The organization has thirty employees and more than one hundred volunteers. The projects are financed by public funds, foundations, support, and sponsorship from companies as well as private members and contributors.

WORK

Program and activities:

Greenlandic Children wants Camp N to offer the kids and youngsters in Narsaq a fantastic summer with a variety of fun and creative activities. The volunteers will decide and plan which activities to offer during the camp.

The first days of the camp coincide with Asivik, which is a local cultural and political festival. So, the activities for the first three days of the camp will take place as part of the Asivik festival.

You should expect long days as the volunteer group typically starts the workday at 10.00 and continues till after dinner in the evening. A typical day will consist of a morning meeting, preparing for the activities, activities, cleaning up after activities, dinner, and an evaluation meeting.

You are off on Sundays.

ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD

We expect you to stay in a shared room with other volunteers of the same sex. Shared kitchen and bathroom facilities will be available.

We will divide the volunteers into cooking and cleaning teams. The group is responsible for shopping, cooking, cleaning, etc.

All groceries are transported by ship. Therefore, you should expect a limited variation and be able to adapt to these local conditions. Most meals in Greenland are based on meat and fish.
