Established in 2005, Volunteers Initiative Nepal (VIN) is a non-profit, non-governmental organization that takes a comprehensive approach to community development. It assists Nepal's most marginalized populations. VIN recruits numerous local and international volunteers each year to achieve this objective. Our primary mission is to improve the quality of life for underprivileged individuals through community empowerment, using volunteering as our strategy for development initiatives.



Our Mission

VIN's mission is to Our mission is to empower marginalized communities through equitable, inclusive, and holistic development programs.

The primary objectives of VIN





- To improve the essential public health condition of the community, people
- To empower women to improve their quality of life
- To facilitate children's development & protect child rights
- To cultivate skills in youth and engage them in development activities.
- To Conserve, promote, and protect the environment and culture for the future generation

• To minimize the risk of natural disasters and provide relief and safety to vulnerable

communities

These objectives are achieved through the engagement of young people and solidarity activities focusing on sustainable development goals, social inclusion, and equal opportunities.

VIN believes in the four pillars of development: Education, Health and Environment, Economy, and basic infrastructure. We have implemented six **programs**: women's empowerment,



Children's Development, Youth Empowerment, Public Health and Medical Care, Environment Conservation, and Disaster Response and relief. VIN mobilizes local and international community and office volunteers, positively impacting the programs.





VIN has fully applied a holistic approach in humanitarian activities (equal focus on Education, Health & Environment, Economy, and Basic infrastructure development) to community empowerment. Through our initiatives, over 370k people directly benefitted.

General information about the workcamp:

VIN organizes international work camps where participants from different countries work on community-based projects. These projects typically focus on education, environmental conservation, cultural exchange, health, and infrastructure development. Our work camps are usually short-term (1–3 weeks).

Participants contribute their time, skills, and energy to the project while experiencing cultural exchange and learning from each other. The projects foster global understanding, teamwork, and sustainable development.

Placement Support Process:

The first day of the program is dedicated to arrival/welcoming day/. Upon arrival, each volunteer is greeted by VIN's local staff at the airport and taken to the VIN hostel for their stay. The second day features a comprehensive orientation at the VIN office in Kathmandu. This session covers important topics such as cultural tips, basic Nepali survival phrases, health and safety advice, preparation for project activities and planning, and an introduction to VIN's mission and work. The volunteers are accommodated to host families/hostel.



A Nepali camp leader will guide volunteers throughout the work camp, and VIN supervisors will make periodic visits to provide follow-up and support. Volunteers can always contact VIN for immediate assistance if they encounter any issues during the camp. On the final day, volunteers will complete a detailed work report, fill out an exit form, and participate in an exit interview and feedback session with VIN executives to share their experiences and suggestions.

Accommodation:

The volunteers will stay with the host family/hostel identified by VIN. The living facilities are simple and basic. Male and female volunteers will share the same living area with separate rooms. The volunteers sleep on simple beds/mattresses. Please bring your sleeping bag.

Requirements:

- Basic English should be spoken among the participants
- Physically sound as per the project requirements.

Participation Fee:

The participation fee is 270 Euros (+30 Euro for transportation in Kathmandu. 100 Euro for Okhaldhunga, 100 Euro for Sindhuli, 50 Euro for Lapsephedi), which is to be paid on arrival at the VIN Office.

Why Okhaldhunga and extra transportation fee:

- It takes one day (250 km) car/bus rough and paved drive from Kathmandu.
- The beautiful Himalayan region is close to Mt. Everest.
- It lacks development and basic infrastructure.
- It is a very needy local area waiting for development.
- Welcoming community and rich in culture.
- Simple lifestyle and smiling people.
- Lovely environment and up and downhill.
- Good and enough support from local staff and community people.
- Volunteers will feel they have contributed to the needy and poor community.

The Participation Fee Covers:

- Food and Accommodation: Nepali Standard at a local host family 3 meals a day
- Transportation: Airport pick up and pick up and drop to the working community site
- Materials for the work camp and community development projects support
- Local volunteers' support cost
- VIN T-shirt and certificate of participation
- 24-hour emergency support
- VIN admin cost.



What's excluded?

Airfare, VISA, Travel medical insurance, return airport transfer, personal travel and weekend activities, and other personal expenses.

Meeting point:

One of the VIN staff will pick up volunteers from the airport. Please send your flight details to VIN on time so we can send your name card and VIN logo to our staff.

If you want to explore the country earlier, you can take a pre-paid taxi at the airport, or VIN can help you with that. You can arrive at the VIN office on the first day.

Tribhuwan International Airport, Kathmandu

Leisure Activities:

You can go sightseeing at various sites around the community. VIN also organizes weekend travel tours to Chitwan Jungle Safari, Pokhara, and Nagarkot at an additional cost if you are interested.

Background/Project: The Children's Development Program is a crucial initiative within VIN's Integrated Community Development Approach. It seeks to safeguard the rights of all children by ensuring access to quality basic education, fostering essential life skills like creativity and leadership, and offering health and hygiene services.

Within the Children's Development Program, VIN conducts various projects, including Children's Clubs (CC), Early Childhood Development (ECD), School Attendance (which includes Teacher Development, Parenting Education, School Infrastructure Development, and Child Sponsorship), and Child Care.

In Nepal, schools concentrate mainly on exams and often overlook the importance of developing essential life skills like creativity and leadership in children. Teachers prioritize reading and writing, which leads to **rote learning**. Consequently, creativity and children's unique differences often go unrecognized.

Many children miss chances to socialize and express their creativity because of their parents' demanding work schedules. These camps are crucial in offering life skills development opportunities for children aged 5 to 12.



We primarily aim to assist disadvantaged communities, as these families often cannot afford to take their children on vacations during winter and summer breaks. Children usually lack a proper structure and environment at home or school to nurture their innate talents.

Children's camps during winter and summer breaks provide excellent settings for exploring their natural skills, such as creativity and leadership. In these camps, national and international volunteers will facilitate engaging and creative activities for the children in the areas where VIN operates.



Objectives:

- The goal is to offer children aged 5 to 12 a unique opportunity for overall development, focusing on their social, emotional, physical, mental, and creative growth while ensuring they have a fun and productive vacation.
- To foster friendship, understanding, and solidarity between local young volunteers and international volunteers.
- To provide a chance to experience and appreciate Nepalese culture and traditions through cultural immersion.

Work / Activities:

Volunteers can engage children in various fun and educational activities during a winter camp and promote overall development.

Physical Exercises: To promote health and well-being, exercise yoga, stretching, sports, or simple fitness routines.

Team-Building Sessions: Organize games and group challenges to encourage collaboration, communication, and social skills.

Creative Workshops: To encourage creativity and self-expression, lead sessions in drawing, coloring, painting, crafting, and origami.

Performing Arts: Teach singing, dancing, drama, and music to boost confidence, enhance creativity, and provide entertainment.

Outdoor Exploration: Plan hikes, nature walks, or outdoor play to combine learning with physical activity and appreciation of the environment.

Language Teaching: To help children improve their communication skills, teach them new vocabulary, practice conversational language, or introduce basic phrases in different languages.

Jitpurphedi community is located in Tarakeshwor Municipality, on the outskirts of Kathmandu District. It is 10-15 km from the main ring road to Balaju, Kathmandu, covered with hills, fields, and woods.

Background/Project:

Environmental protection ranks among the most urgent priorities in the modern world. Key aspects include tackling solid waste management issues in urban and rural Nepal, significantly impacting the environment and public health. Solid waste, a by-product of human activities, is increasing due to rapid urbanization, improved living standards, and changing consumption patterns. Effective waste management can turn it into a valuable resource, while poor handling leads to severe environmental degradation and health

hazards.

In VIN's working communities, including schools, improper waste disposal, such as food remains and other materials, is a significant problem. These issues contribute to littering and elevate the potential for public health crises. Children are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of poor waste management, facing risks such as respiratory problems from dumping site dust, diarrhea, skin diseases, and eye infections.

The prevalence of non-biodegradable waste (NBW) exacerbates the issue, particularly in urban and

semi-urban areas. In Nepal, the challenge of NBW is especially evident in rural regions like Jitpurphedi, Kavresthali, and Okharpauwa, located near Kathmandu. This waste causes environmental degradation and impacts agricultural land, diminishing productivity and disrupting farmers' livelihoods who rely on local produce to support their families and livestock.

Preventing the build-up of NBW in communities is crucial, as it worsens sanitation-related diseases and degrades land quality. Tackling solid waste management issues in urban and rural Nepal necessitates prioritizing sustainable practices like waste segregation, recycling, and composting.

Under the theme "Environmental Stewards: Preserving Our Common Home," this project aims to empower communities to adopt proactive waste management strategies. This initiative seeks to mitigate waste-related issues, improve public health, and promote



Nepal's cleaner, greener future by raising awareness, encouraging sustainable practices, and implementing community-driven efforts.

Objective:

• Prevent and control water, land, and air pollution through environmental education and cleaning activities.

Activities:-

- Organize the waste management /Community clean-up campaign involving community people.
- Train local people on garbage management using the 3R principles: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle (segregation, disposal, domestic methodology for making compost fertilizer, etc.)
- Develop a kitchen garden concept and train the households to implement it.

Background/Project:



VIN constructed and opened the NaraTika Community Learning Center (NTCLC) in the tranquil village of Nisankhe, Okhaldhunga. This ambitious project is designed to support learners of all ages. It features a dedicated children's center for children aged 3 to 8, a library for those aged eight and older, and facilities that include training rooms, a conference hall that accommodates 200 people, a workspace for 16-20 individuals, and a dormitory for 50-60 people.

The center features restrooms and showers for both men and women, a lobby, a computer lab, and a multipurpose seminar hall that offers extensive resources to support learning and community development.

NTCLC is a dynamic hub for education, empowerment, and sustainable practices. It promotes lifelong learning and innovation and includes a vegetable farming plot developed using permaculture techniques, emphasizing environmental sustainability.

The center seeks to enhance literacy, creativity, and skill development for children, youth, women, and adults through its diverse programs and interactive learning space. It is looking for volunteers and interns to



assist with the NaraTika Community Learning Center, which serves the underprivileged communities of Okahldhunga. This could be your ideal volunteer opportunity if you enjoy gardening, farming, painting, or other activities.

Volunteers at the "Creative Minds Library Camp: Enriching Young Minds Through Learning, Sparking Smiles" engage children aged 5 to 16 with interactive storytelling sessions that ignite their imaginations and cultivate a love for reading.

They organize library resources, create a welcoming reading environment, and establish catalog systems to enhance accessibility. Volunteers share stories to convey moral values, cultural traditions, and life skills while assisting children in overcoming literacy challenges. Activities such as mobile reading sessions, creative arts workshops, and support in writing stories or poems foster self-expression and creativity.

Additionally, volunteers deliver engaging English lessons through songs and rhymes, introduce educational games to foster critical thinking and teach teamwork, empathy, and communication skills through dynamic discussions. Storytelling and reading challenges further inspire children, making the camp a fulfilling and enjoyable experience.

Objective:

To enhance the literacy, creativity, and life skills of children aged 5-16 by fostering a love for reading, promoting self-expression through storytelling and arts, and providing opportunities to develop critical thinking, teamwork, and communication skills in a



supportive and engaging environment.

Work:

• Conduct engaging storytelling sessions for children aged 5-16 to spark their imagination and instill a love for reading.

• Sort and catalog books to create an accessible library system. Design and decorate

a welcoming, child-friendly reading space.

- Organize cleaning campaign in building and manage garden area.
- Visit local schools to organize mobile reading activities.
- Facilitate art and craft sessions to encourage creativity and self-expression.
- Help children write short stories, poems, or journals to develop their writing skills.
- Conduct games that promote critical thinking and problem-solving skills.
- Teach Basic English through songs, rhymes, and interactive activities.
- Use storytelling and discussions to teach moral values, teamwork, empathy, and communication skills.

Location:

Siddhicharan Municipality Ward 2 is located in Nisankhe, within the Okhaldhunga district, about 250 km from Kathmandu. A local jeep can transport you there in approximately 8 to 10 hours. This area highlights the beauty of Nepal's hilly and mountainous landscape, surrounded by forests and fertile fields. Background/Project:

The concept of elder care has emerged relatively recently in Nepal, coinciding with shifts in familial structures and societal dynamics. As job opportunities disperse families, older adults increasingly find

themselves marginalized, isolated, and neglected. Few care homes cater to older people throughout Nepal, highlighting a significant gap in support services.

Defined as individuals aged 60 and older, the elderly population in Nepal faces significant challenges, mainly related to poverty and lack of resources. A staggering majority cope with the lasting consequences of lifelong deprivation, worsened by factors such as limited access to education, inadequate healthcare, poor nutrition, reduced social status, widespread discrimination, and difficulties with physical mobility.

Traditionally, family structures in Nepal have upheld the responsibility of caring for older people within extended family homes. However, the landscape is evolving rapidly, characterized by smaller family units and increased participation of women and youth in the labor force.



Additionally, migration from rural areas to urban centers or abroad in search of employment has further strained family bonds, leaving many older individuals isolated and struggling with loneliness.

Approximately 30% of Nepal's elderly population lives below the poverty line, struggling to meet their basic needs due to financial limitations and resources.

The standard health challenges faced by Nepal's elderly population include high rates of non-communicable diseases such as hypertension, diabetes, and arthritis. Additionally, respiratory illnesses like chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) are common, mainly due to factors such as indoor air pollution from traditional cooking methods. Studies indicate that approximately 40% of elderly individuals in Nepal experience social isolation, which arises from factors including changing family dynamics, the migration of younger generations for work, and a lack of community support systems designed to meet the needs of older adults.

These figures underscore the need for comprehensive support systems and initiatives to address the multifaceted challenges faced by Nepal's elderly population.



To address these issues, VIN organizes camps where volunteers can participate in this Elder Care project. The volunteers provide comprehensive support to elderly individuals in their daily activities, including health management, personal hygiene, and household cleaning, which helps enhance their well-being, happiness, and comfort.

Objectives:

- To provide comprehensive support to elderly individuals in their day-to-day activities, including health management, personal hygiene, and household cleaning, to enhance their overall well-being, happiness, and comfort in daily living.
- To promote friendship, understanding, and solidarity among local young volunteers and cross-national volunteers.
- To provide an opportunity to understand and appreciate the Nepalese culture and traditions via cultural immersion.

Work / Activities: Drawing from your experience, you will participate in various activities to support elderly individuals. This includes helping nurses care for sick, elderly individuals, performing health checks, and administering first aid as needed.

Additionally, you will act as a caretaker, ensuring the well-being and comfort of elderly residents. Your responsibilities will also include assisting with food preparation and maintaining sanitation standards. You will organize social and recreational activities to encourage engagement and happiness among the elderly residents. You will coordinate cleaning and possibly farming tasks to sustain a conducive living environment for the elderly home.

Location: The Lapsephedi Community is located northeast of Kathmandu. Nestled amidst the serene foothills of the Himalayas, it offers a picturesque landscape characterized by lush greenery, terraced fields, and breathtaking mountain vistas. The community is approximately 40 kilometers from Kathmandu.

Participation Fee: The fee is 270 Euros (+50 Euros for transportation), payable upon arrival at the VIN Office.

Part I: Youth Empowerment

Youth from all countries represent the true wealth and future of their nations. In Nepal, young people comprise approximately 20.8 percent of the total population (ages 16-25), while 40.68 percent fall within the 16-40 age group. Despite being educated, they struggle to compete in the job market due to a lack of life skills and vocational training. Life skills enhance young people's well-being and help them develop into active and productive members of their communities.

Part I: Permaculture (Sustainable food production)

VIN's Environmental and Conservation Programs raise community awareness of critical environmental issues and develop effective solutions. VIN runs various ecological projects that aim to conserve, promote, and protect the environment and culture while preventing, mitigating, and controlling water, land, and air pollution to enhance the health, safety, and welfare of current and future generations. We utilize permaculture for sustainable farming and have been teaching and implementing it since 2018. We believe that permaculture plays a vital role in restoring the entire ecosystem!

Agriculture provides subsistence and employment for 80% of Nepal's population, accounting for approximately 39 % of the total GDP. The sector's development is crucial for empowering those who rely on it and for the national economy.

Since Nepal is in the Himalayan region, climate change has significantly impacted the country. Water sources are drying up, new types of moths and insects have emerged, and the timing of crop cultivation has shifted. Unexpected climate changes, unpredictable rainfall, droughts, and more are the consequences of global warming that Nepalese farmers are facing.

12 Principles of Permaculture

- **Observe and interact**—Let's slow down and appreciate our surroundings and others. Let's also slow down and interact with others in real life, not on our phones.
- Catch and store energy—Relax to restore balance and energy. This means associating with those who bring positive energy and doing things that bring joy and energize me, like running and learning.
- Obtain a yield. In permaculture, this might mean planting to create the most food. The food is the reward. In life, we can work to obtain an intrinsic or extrinsic reward. These rewards need not be strictly financial. Perhaps the reward makes a difference in your client's life or makes your coworker's day a little easier.
- **Apply self-regulation and accept feedback.** Self-regulation or self-control allows us to be accountable and empowers us. Feedback helps us improve, which will help us excel at work.
- Use and value renewable resources and services and





produce no waste- These principles are common tips for living an eco-friendly lifestyle and creating a more sustainable world.

- **Design from patterns to details** Permaculture calls for standing back and observing patterns in nature and society and then filling in the details; this might also make for a more efficient and logical way to work.
- Integrate rather than segregate, use, and value diversity—These principles perfectly describe how we should all live in harmony with each other. We should integrate everyone into our communities and value diversity.
- Use small and slow solutions. Permaculture uses small and slow solutions because they are easier to manage than more prominent solutions and allow for the use of local resources, leading to more sustainable outcomes. While this may not always be feasible—sometimes, we need significant and fast solutions to solve some of society's most critical problems—this principle can be a valuable problem-solving tool.
- Use edges and value the marginal. Permaculture suggests that the interface between things is where the most interesting things happen. These are often the system's most valuable, diverse, and productive parts. For example, extending a community garden onto an edge near an unused railway might be a good idea. In life and work, we can use our resources more effectively, including the edges.
- Creatively use and respond to change—This principle requires no explanation, but it remains essential in life and works in a changing world. To remain a viable and sustainable business and to live well, we must be resilient and creatively work with change.

Using these principles, we can create a better life and a better world by caring for the earth and caring for people.

Background/Project: Children's Development is one of the major programs in VIN's Integrated Community Development Approach. The Goal of the Children's development program is to protect the rights of all children by providing them access to basic quality education, developing their life skills & providing access to health services through community health programs.

Even recently, schools in Nepal have focused on examinations and done little to develop students' creativity. Teachers only focus on reading and writing—**rote learning**. Children's creativity is not explored. Due to parents' busy work schedules, most children do not have the opportunity to socialize and be creative. Such camps are essential to provide

opportunities for socialization and creativity for children (aged 6-12).

At VIN's working area in Okhaldhunga, children lack the proper structure and environment to

Background/Project:

Historically, violence against women and girls has been widespread in Nepali society but is still an unreported problem in Nepal. It is reported that one-third of married women have experienced emotional, physical, or sexual violence from their spouse in their marital relationship. The women experience violence when trafficked into forced labor or prostitution. Between 5,000 and 12,000 girls and women aged 10 to 20 years of age are trafficked every year, 75 percent of whom are below 18 years of age, and the majority of whom are sold into forced prostitution.

In Nepal, there exist six kinds of violence against women and girls, mainly sexual abuse, incest, and rape by family members and others; recruitment by family members into prostitution; neglect by family members, even to the point of death, feticide, and infanticide, dowry demand and wife abuse.



This project aims to provide

human rights education from professionals through awareness-raising campaigns to people, especially women and girls. Different activities like Drama performance education in public with the message of 'Say "NO" to Violence against Women' will be conducted. A forum in a public place for interaction with local community people is organized to have interaction on Women's Violence, problems, and their solutions. The target population is community leaders, teachers, women's groups, and teenage girls. It aims to develop peace and protect human rights.

The schools where we are conducting camps

lack a library and other infrastructure facilities. Some schools have some collections, but they are poorly managed and used. The rooms are poorly painted, and books are not arranged

properly. Children are not taught the skills of using a library and its importance.





Volunteers will manage the library, organize activities with schoolchildren, and conduct classes on library management and use. The library camp will help children develop reading and writing skills. Volunteers with abilities in sports, arts and crafts, music, dance, drama, and outdoor group games are welcome.

Through this project, we want to ensure that every student has the opportunity to learn, enjoy reading, and create new knowledge and understanding using a library.

- To work for a children's development project and exchange experience

Part II Festive Camp

Teej celebration

Teej is a festival celebrated by Nepali women for the long life of their husbands and the long and firm relationship between them until the death of this life and all the lives to come. Teej is observed for marital happiness, the well-being of spouse and children, and the purification of one's body and soul. Teej is the most famous festival among Nepali women. Teej is a tiny

red insect that emerges from the soil during the rainy season. It is said Teej got its name from the same red insect. That is why Teej is celebrated in Red.

Decked up in red sarees, red tika, and bangles, women sing and dance to traditional folk songs for days. It is especially significant for married women when they get a special invitation to visit their maternal home and feast. It is a sight to behold at the Pashupatinath temple, where thousands of women draped in Red and green





throng the temple's premises. Observers can take photos of these women dancing merrily, where foreigners, especially women tourists, are sometimes requested to participate in the merry-making.

The eve (first day of Teej) is called Dar Khane Din. This evening, the grand feast takes place. The grand feast is called "Dar."

The second day is Teej's primary day (fasting day). Some women take it very rigid. They even live without a piece of food and drops of water, while some others take liquid and fruit.

On the third day, women get up early at dawn, get cleaned, and do the puja again. Only after this puja do women take solid food.

The fourth and final day is called Rishi Panchami. After completing the previous day's pooja, women pay homage to various deities and bathe with red mud found on the roots of the sacred Datiwan bush and its leaves. This act of purification is the final ritual of Teej, after which women are considered forgiven for all their sins."

Background/Project:

Part I- Creative Classrooms: Enhancing Schools and Inspiring Young Minds

Okhaldhunga, District of the Himalayas - This small paradise is in the Everest Region. It is located in the North-East part of Nepal. Okhaldhunga is one of the most beautiful places in Nepal. If Okhaldhunga is viewed with a sacred vision, it has numerous fascinating sights. VIN's Project site (Taluwa, Bhadaure, and Thulachhap communities) is southeast of the district headquarters, Okhaldhunga. From Kathmandu, the bus route is about 250 km, a rough trip that takes one day (7-9 hrs). In Okhaldhunga, VIN implements an integrated approach to community development.

Because of its geographical situation, Okhaldhunga has limited developmental activities and facilities. Unlike Kathmandu, it has several illiterate people. Okhaldhunga lacks proper education facilities. Due to this, young people move from Okhaldhunga to other cities like Kathmandu or fly abroad to secure appropriate education. There are schools, but they don't

impart quality education. Not many people complete high school due to poverty, lack of good schools and resources, and geographical remoteness.

According to VIN's baseline survey, only 91.56% of children have been attending school regularly, but 1.44% of children are not regularly in school. Similarly, 10.42% of students drop out of school. 2.99%



of families are well aware of child rights, and 20.69% know a fair amount about child rights. But, 76.30% of families do not know anything about child rights. Most children who drop out are involved in household work, field/farm work, household plowing, agriculture labor, collecting grass/firewood, grazing cattle, etc.



"Creative Classrooms: Enhancing Schools and Inspiring Young Minds" Work camps will be organized with local community schools and stakeholders to create a child-friendly teaching and learning environment. Most schools lack basic infrastructure, such as buildings, educational materials, playgrounds, and drinking water. Volunteers can make a big difference in the daily lives of these children by providing the necessities listed above and educating them in fun and creative ways.

The work camp will also teach children from poor and marginalized communities about Basic English, mathematics, Health, and Hygiene in formal and non-formal schools. Environmental protection through creative learning methods like art, music, games, house visits, and local meetings will also be held with people as part of intercultural learning and health and hygiene awareness. In addition, volunteers will also get a chance to participate in simple renovation work at local schools and engage in activities. Volunteers will witness and participate in the cultural programs with the local community as part of the cultural exchange.

Objectives:

- To create a child-friendly learning environment for the children of Okhaldhunga by developing resources and educational activities;
- To provide children from disadvantaged communities a unique opportunity for overall development (social, emotional, physical, mental, and creativity) & provide a fun time for children aged 6-12.
- To promote friendship, understanding, and solidarity among local, young, national, and international volunteers.

Work: Paint and decorate the classrooms. Renovate school areas, walls, etc. Teach students Basic English and mathematics. Play sports, Teach Basic English and mathematics, health and hygiene, and environmental protection through creative learning methods like art, music, games, etc.

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On the third day, women get up early at dawn, get cleaned, and do the puja again. Only after this puja do women take solid food.

The fourth and final day is called Rishi Panchami. After completing the previous day's pooja, women pay homage to various deities and bathe with red mud found on the roots of the sacred Datiwan bush and its leaves. This act of purification is the final ritual of Teej, after which women are considered forgiven for all their sins."

Objective:

- Understand the importance of the Teej festival and know how it is celebrated.
- Understanding of Nepali culture and participating in the celebration.

Activities: -

- To celebrate Teej with women who have positive energy in the community.
- Participate in dancing with the community women
- Cultural exchange

Nepal faces significant challenges as a developing country, with over 25% of its population living below the poverty line. Ranked 145th on the Human Development Index, the government has a life expectancy of 70.7 years. Malnutrition affects 29% of children under the age of five, and access to health and sanitation facilities remains severely limited. In many rural and underserved communities, awareness of proper hygiene practices is minimal, with only 12% of poor households having adequate sanitation facilities. Furthermore, about 5.6 million people, or 20% of the population, lack access to clean drinking water, creating additional health risks.

Sanitation, hygiene, and access to safe water are crucial for improving health outcomes and fostering social and economic development. These factors are integral to achieving the Sustainable

Development Goal of equitable sanitation for all. Without them, communities remain vulnerable to WASH-related diseases exacerbated by poor garbage disposal practices. These issues threaten public health and harm the environment. There is an urgent need for education and



advocacy campaigns to raise awareness and drive lasting change in water, sanitation, and hygiene practices.
